felt worthless and I felt like that was all I deserved, that there was no way out, that there was no hope, that's who I was, that's who I was meant to be," Shauna says of her time spent struggling with homelessness and addiction.

Shauna's childhood was a tumultuous one. Her parents fought frequently and struggled with addiction. Shauna began abusing substances herself at an early age and though she, "tried really hard to be a different parent and a different type of adult from what I witnessed ... I found myself repeating that exact same lifestyle."

Eventually, Shauna married, then divorced, and lost custody of her four children. She struggled with addiction and found herself homeless. "I felt myself going down a road that had no return," she says.

During her ten years of homelessness, Shauna became very angry with God, blaming Him for what she had become. "I was at a dead end, and I didn't know how to get out of it." In spite of her anger toward God, Shauna believes He pushed her toward recovery. She remembers praying and asking Him to give her the strength she needed to become the person she was born to be.

Shauna came to the Mission, and life began to change. "I remember walking in and not expecting it to be so warm and welcoming and clean," she says. While at the Mission, Shauna regained custody of her children and began to heal from her past trauma. "I found strength, and I obviously found hope, and I stopped believing the lies of the devil or low self-esteem I had."

Today, thanks to God and the Mission's faithful partners, Shauna is a new person. She now lives with her four children, and she works at the Mission's emergency shelter for women and children. "I appreciate everyone at the Mission," she says. "Everybody has made a difference in my life."

Ivin had a hole in his life. "Let me tell you what was missing," he says. "People who cared about me and loved me. I never knew what that felt like."

Alvin began drinking alcohol and abusing drugs after suffering abuse as a child. Though he was able to build a successful career, his life spiraled down when he began using crack cocaine. He relocated to try to get a fresh start, but he soon succumbed to his addiction again and wound up homeless.

"I was sleeping in this abandoned garage by a trash can," Alvin shares. "It was a bad time for me ... I had no will. I had no strength to change."

Alvin found help with a rescue mission in Oregon and graduated from its program. Unfortunately, Alvin relapsed and considered taking his own life. "When I walked out of there, I knew that I needed to do something different than I did in the past, and that's to go get help," Alvin says.




God then led Alvin to Seattle's Union Gospel Mission. While in the Mission's Men's Recovery Program, God began filling the hole in his life. A volunteer, Devin, made a lasting impression on Alvin. "He came beside me," Alvin says. "He cared for me. He was there for me. He helped me understand that I am loved." Devin helped Alvin begin to care for himself again, something he'd lost in his years struggling with addiction.

Today, thanks to God, and volunteers like Devin, Alvin enjoys a new life. After graduating from the program, Alvin decided to volunteer at the Mission. That led to a job offer, and now he works as Support Services Administrator. "Part of my prayer is, God, give me an opportunity for me to share your goodness with someone else."

At the Mission, we are so thankful for the lasting impact our volunteers have on our homeless neighbors' lives.

This is the stage you see most often people living on the streets, often in the midst of their addictions, barely surviving, if at all. Our teams go out proactively to offer lifesaving assistance.
